President Abraham Lincoln declared all slaves to be free

January 1-2 FEAST DAY OF ST. BASIL

Commemorating the death of Saint Basil. It is celebrated on January 1 in the Eastern Churches, on January 2 in the Western Churches, and on January 14 in churches that follow the Julian calendar.

January 3

FEAST OF THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS The celebration has been held on different dates, usually in January, because 1 January, eight days after Christmas, commemorates

the naming of the child Jesus.

January 5 TWELFTH NIGHT

A festival in some branches of Christianity that takes place on the last night of the Twelve Days of Christmas, marking the coming of the Epiphany

January 6

EPIPHANY OR DIA DE LOS REYES (THREE KINGS DAY); ARMENIAN ORTHODOX CHRISTMAS

A Christian festival held in honour of the coming of the three kings to the infant Jesus Christ.

January 7

ORTHODOX CHRISTMAS/FEAST OF THE NATIVITY

The equivalent of December 25th on the Julian calendar. Many Orthodox Christians celebrate Christmas day on or near this date.

January 7

CHRISTMAS IN RUSSIA Christmas is considered a high holiday by

the Russian Orthodox Church, one of the 12 Great Feasts, and one of only four of which are preceded by a period of fasting.

January 13

LORI-MAGHI Wintertime Punjabi folk festival, celebrated primarily by Sikhs and Hindus from the Punjab region of Indian subcontinent.

ORTHODOX NEW YEAR The start of the new year under the Julian

calendar

January 14 MAKAR SANKRANTI OR MAGHI

Hindu: Celebrates the harvest

January 14-17

THAI PONGAL

Thai Pongal is a Tamil and Hindu harvest festival designed to give thanks to the Sun God.

January 17

BIRTHDAY OF GURU GOBIND SINGH Sikh festival that commemorates the

birthday of Guru Gobind Singh Ji, the tenth Guru of the Sikhs. It is a religious celebration in which prayers for prosperity are offered.

January 22 VIETNAMESE NEW YEAR (TET FESTIVAL)

The most important festival of the year in Vietnam. Its name, Tet, is an abbreviation for Tet Nguyen Dan, which is Vietnamese for the feast of the first morning of the first day of their calendar. 2023 is Year of the Rabbit.

January 24

BELL LET'S TALK DAY (MENTAL HEALTH)

Bell Canada supports Mental Health initiatives and partners with over 1100 Organizations to creating positive change.

January 26 REPUBLIC DAY OF INDIA

National holiday in India. It honours the date on which the Constitution of India came into effect on 26 January 1950 replacing the Government of India Act (1935) as the governing document of India and thus, turning the nation into a newly formed republic

January 27 INTERNATIONAL HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY

Designated by the United Nations (UN), this day commemorates the genocide that resulted in the death of millions of people at the hands of the Nazi regime and its collaborators.

FEBRUARY

All February BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month in the United States and Canada. Since 1976, the month has been designated to remember the contributions of people of the African diaspora

February 3 RED DRESS DAY

National Day of Awareness for Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls

February 3 SETSUBUN-SAI (BEGINNING OF SPRING)

One day before the start of spring according to the Japanese lunar calendar. It is not a national holiday. For many centuries, people have been performing rituals with the purpose of chasing away evil spirits at the start of spring.

February 5 LANTERN FESTIVAL

A Chinese festival that marks the final day of the traditional Chinese New Year celebrations.

February 10 LUNAR NEW YEAR (CHINESE NEW YEAR)

Lunar New Year is also commonly known as Chinese New Year. Each New Year is associated with one of the twelve different animals of the Zodiac.

February 10 LOSAR (TIBETAN NEW YEAR)

The holiday is a new year's festival, celebrated on the first day of the lunisolar Tibetan calendar, which corresponds to a date in February or March in the Gregorian calendar.

February 14

VASANT PANCHAMI

Hindu festival that highlights the coming of spring.

February 15 PARINIRVANA OR NIRVANA DAY

Remembers Buddha's passing in 483 BC and his final nirvana. Commemoration of Buddha's death at the age of 80.

February 18 MAHA SHIVARATI

Hindu: One of the major festivals in Hinduism dedicated to worshipping Lord Shiva. People celebrate Maha Shivratri by fasting, keeping vigil and doing pujas at homes and temples.

February 20 LOUIS RIEL DAY

Louis Riel Day is an annual general holiday in the Canadian province of Manitoba on the third Monday of February. It commemorates the life of Louis Riel, a politician who represented the Métis people's interests.

February 24 MAGHI-PURNIMA

Hindu festival especially for worshippers of Lord Vishnu. Millions of devotees take a holy bath on this day. Devotees also carry out charity work on this day.

February 28 PINK SHIRT DAY

(Anti-Bullying) - CKNW Kids' Fund

February 29-March 19 NINETEEN DAY FAST

The Nineteen-Day Fast is a nineteen-day period of the year during which members of the Bahá'í Faith adhere to a sunrise-tosunset fast. Along with obligatory prayer, it is one of the greatest obligations of a Bahá'í, and its chief purpose is spiritual: to reinvigorate the soul and bring the person closer to God.

MARCH

March 8 INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

A time to reflect on progress made, to call for change and to celebrate acts of courage and determination by ordinary women, who have played an extraordinary role in the history of their countries and communities. The world has made unprecedented advances, but no country has achieved gender equality.

March 17 ST PATRICK'S DAY

Irish Heritage Day marks the birthday of this Irish saint, who brought Christianity to the Emerald Isle

March 10 RAMADAN BEGINS

Observed by Muslims as a month of fasting (sawm), prayer, reflection and community.

GREAT LENT

Great Lent, or the Great Fast, is the most important fasting season in the church year in the Eastern Orthodox Church which prepares Christians for the greatest feast of the church year, Pascha (Easter)

March 20 NAW-RUZ

Baha'l New Year

March 23-24 PURIM

Jewish celebration that marks the time when the Jewish community living in Persia was saved from genocide. On Purim, Jewish people offer charity and share food with friends.

March 29

GOOD FRIDAY Christian holiday commemorating the crucifixion of Jesus and his death

at Calvary.

March 31

INTERNATIONAL TRANSGENDER DAY OF VISIBILITY

Annual event dedicated to celebrating transgender people and raising awareness of discrimination faced by transgender people worldwide, as well as a celebration of their contributions to society.

March 31

EASTER MONDAY

Celebrated in the Catholic church recalling the meeting of the angel with the women who arrived at Jesus's tomb.

APRIL

April 2 PALM SUNDAY Christian

April 2

WORLD AUTISM AWARENESS DAY *Recognition of people with autism and*

those who love and support them.

April 6 TARTAN DAY

ARTAN DAY

Recognizes and celebrates the contributions of Scots and their descendants in Canada

April 6 HOLY THURSDAY

The day during Holy Week that commemorates the Washing of the Feet (Maundy) and Last Supper of Jesus Christ with the Apostles, as described in the canonical gospels.

April 6 LAYLAT AL-QADR Muslim

April 9 VIMY RIDGE DAY

Vimy Ridge was a particularly important tactical feature. Its capture by the Canadians was essential to the advances by the British Third Army to the south and of exceptional importance to checking the German attacks in the area in 1918.

April 9 EASTER

Christian festival and cultural holiday commemorating the resurrection of Jesus from the dead, described in the New Testament as having occurred on the third day of his burial following his crucifixion by the Romans at Calvary

April 9 RAMADAN ENDS Muslim

April 9-10 EID AL-FITR

Celebrated by Muslims worldwide because it marks the end of the month-long dawn-tosunset fasting of Ramadan

April 22 PASSOVER BEGINS

Jewish: From how to host online to how to make a digital Haggadah.

April 24 THERAVADA NEW YEAR

The Theravada new year is celebrated for three days from the first full moon in April. Theravada means "the teachings of the elders". Levada is the dominant from of Buddhism mainly practicing in prevalent in South East Asian countries including India, Thailand, Burma, Laos, Cambodia, and Sri Lanka

April 14 SINHALESE NEW YEAR

A Sri Lankan holiday that celebrates the traditional New Year of the Sinhalese people in Sri Lanka

April 14 VAISAKHI

Marks the first day of the month of Vaisakha and is usually celebrated annually on 13 or 14 April

April 14

PUTHANDU Tamil New Year

April 14-20 NATIONAL VOLUNTEER WEEK

National Volunteer Week (NVW) is a time to celebrate and thank Canada's 12.7 million volunteers

April 16 ORTHODOX EASTER

April 17-18 HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY/YOM HASHOAH

A Holocaust memorial day or Holocaust remembrance day is an annual observance to commemorate the victims of the Holocaust, the genocide of six million European Jews by Nazi Germany.

April 20 START OF RIVDAN

A twelve-day festival in the Bahá'í Faith, commemorating Bahá'u'lláh's declaration that he was a Manifestation of God

April 22 INTERNATIONAL EARTH DAY

April 23 SAINT GEORGE'S DAY

The feast day of Saint George as celebrated by various Christian Churches and by the several nations, old kingdoms, regions, states, countries and cities of which Saint George is the patron saint - including Bulgaria, England, Georgia, Portugal, as well as the Spanish communities of Cáceres, Alcoy, Aragon and Catalonia

April 25-27 GATHERING OF NATIONS

More than 500 Native American tribes meet to celebrate their traditions and cultures

MAY

May 5 SOUTH ASIAN ARRIVAL DAY

In April, 1997 the Indo-Trinidadian Canadian Association (ITCA) was formed and immediately started Indian Arrival Day celebrations that year. Also that year, community activist Asha Maharaj organized a display of Indian artifacts, the Trinidad and Tobago Association of Ottawa held its first celebration, and the Caribbean East Indian Cultural Organization headed by radio host Richard Aziz organized an Indian Arrival celebration in Toronto

May 5 CINCO DE MAYO

Commemorates Mexico's defeat of the French army, observed primarily by Mexican Americans

May 15-21 MENTAL HEALTH WEEK

May 17

INTERNATIONAL DAY AGAINST HOMOPHOBIA, TRANSPHOBIA AND BIPHOBIA

May 19

PENTECOST

Christian holiday of Pentecost is celebrated on the 50th day (the seventh Sunday) from Easter Sunday.[2] It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the 12 Apostles and the virgin-mother of Jesus Christ, while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks

May 20

ASIAN GOLD RIBBON DAY

Stand in Solidarity against Anti-Asian Racism

May 20 VICTORIA DAY Queen Victoria's birthday

May 23 DECLARATION OF THE BAB Baha'i

May 23 VESAK

Observed by Buddhists in South Asia and Southeast Asia as well as Tibet and Mongolia. The festival commemorates the birth, enlightenment (Nibbāna), and death (Parinirvāna) of Gautama Buddha in Theravada Tibetan Buddhism and Navayana.

JUNE

All June PRIDE MONTH (LGBTQIAA+)

June 11-13 SHAVOUT

Jewish holiday that occurs on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of Sivan (it may fall between May 15 and June 14 on the Gregorian calendar)

June 19 JUNETEENTH

Black American; Commentates the liberation of slaves in Texas, and celebrated nationwide

June 21

NATIONAL INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY Native American

June 14-19 THE HAJJ

Islamic; annual pilgrimage to Mecca in Saudi Arabia, required by all able Muslims at least once in their lifetime

June 17

EID AL-ADHA

Annual Islamic observance for many Muslims in Canada

JULY

July 1 CANADA DAY

Federal statutory holiday celebrating Canadian Confederation

July 5

NATIONAL INJURY PREVENTION DAY *First Monday of July*

July 6 HIJRI NEW YEAR Muslim

July 8-9 MARTYRDOM OF THE BAB

On the morning of July 9, 1850 in Tabriz, a 30-year-old Persian merchant known as the Báb was charged with apostasy and shot by order of the Prime Minister of the Persian Empire

July 17 MUHARRAN

Is the first month of the Islamic calendar. It is one of the four sacred months of the year when warfare is forbidden.

AUGUST

August 1 EMANCIPATION DAY

Canadians are invited to reflect, educate and engage in the ongoing fight against anti-Black racism and discrimination

August 5 CIVIC HOLIDAY

August 15 FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION

Roman Catholic; celebrating the belief of the entry into heaven of the Virgin Mary

August 19 RAKSHA BANDHAN

Traditionally Hindu, annual rite, or ceremony, which is central to a festival of the same name celebrated in South Asia, and in other parts of the world significantly influenced by Hindu culture

August 26

KRISHNA JANMASHTAMI BEGINS

Annual Hindu festival that celebrates the birth of Krishna, the eighth avatar of Vishnu.

SEPTEMBER

All September HISPANIC HERITAGE MONTH
